TIME TO PLAY

"Changing" (Spin City 12" S11189)

Produced by Intense

Ace Beat, the label that brought us the fab "Garage Movement" EP by Intense last year, enters the nineties with an associated label (Spin City) and a progressively retro song entitled "Changing." The sound is definitely 70's R&B. If groups like South Shore Commission, Impact, Double Exposure and Ecstasy, Passion & Pain mean anything to you then "Changing" should be added to your playlist ASAP.

Start with the two mixes on Side A - AM/FM Mix and the Club Classic Mix - in order to get the real impact of this song. Beautiful keyboards, a bassline that pumps and lively percussion take the "there'll be a better day" message home. Add to this the vocalizing of Gordon Nelson, Jr., Wayne Parkham and Ricky Nelson and you've got a musical sensation that very well could have been around in the early-to-mid seventies.

And, if you really need to, you can flip the record over for the House Mix and House Dub Mix. However, it's not necessary because the A side is so brilliant. 120 BPM.

APHRODISIAC

"Song Of The Siren" (Nugroove 12" NG-036) Produced by Ronald Burrell

"When Can I Call You" (Nugroove 12" NG-032) Produced by Ronald Burrell

Two new Ronald Burrell productions that warrant your immediate attention include Aphrodisiac's "Song Of The Siren" and Lisa Lee's "When Can I Call You." As is customary with Mr. Burrell, he has written, produced and orchestrated each track. And, as usual, each song is heavily influenced by an R&B club groove while constantly delving into the underground.

"Song Of The Siren" takes us on a journey to a place where seagulls fly and waves come crashing down onto the waters that made them. It is a sensuously erotic trip that, at times, reminds me of "Sueno Latino." It's sexy. It's vibrant. And it's got wonderful breaks where the rhythm stops cold and all we hear is the sound of water and seagulls. Fitting in with this dreamy atmosphere is the "ooh-ing" of Ronald Burrell. Just Beautiful. 123 BPM.

Lisa Lee's song, on the other hand, is more in the styling of Bas Noir and Roqui. "When Can I Call You" incorporates a wicked bassline that is quite reminiscent of "D" Train's "You're The One For Me." There are a potpourri of mixes - six in all. All provided by Ronald Burrell except the extremely busy (no pun intended) British Telecom Mix which is handled by Tommy Musto and Frakie Bones. My favorites include the Long Distance 12", Little Black Book Mix and the fierce Disconnected Dub. This is what telephone love is all about. 124 BPM.

JAY WILLIAMS

"Sweat" (Big Beat 12" BB-0011) Produced by Nelson "Paradise" Roman

"I can see a day when there's no more crying. No more bias, violence and no more dying. No. People treated fairly, living life as one. C'mon South Africa, you know that you are wrong . . . " This half spoken/half sung intro sets the tone for what is to follow. That's right, a socially aware song that says "we got to sweat to free this land."

A rhythm track and bassline that really "sweat" add more fuel to the fire making the lyrics even more powerful. It's a combination that is too fierce. The flute and keyboard playing deftly give the song an authentic SA feel while the backing male chorus chanting "oohwey-ooh" gives "Sweat" that tribal feel. Rising above all of this is newcomer Jay Williams who appears to be getting his career off to a good start. There is enough gruffness in his voice to make us realize he means what he says.

In order to hear the inspired lyrics in full you must play the Sweat The Club Mix. Otherwise, try the dripping with sweat Dripping Dub or the Peech Boys' styled Light Years Mix. There is enough here to satisfy all. 121 BPM. There'll be a better day . . .

WILL DOWNING

"Come Together As One" (Island 12" 0-96502) Produced by Will Downing and Greg Smith

Like Jay Williams' "Sweat," this new release by Will Downing can best be described as raising consciousness through lyrics. With the (hopeful) imminent release of Nelson Mandela, "Come Together As One" may be the song that sets the tone for the nineties. This is music with a clear message and that message is UNITY. As Will sings, "There's more to the world than black and white."

On this release, Gail "Sky" King, David Morales and Frankie Knuckles have really outdone themselves. They have given us truly spirited and uplifting rhythm tracks complete with fierce basslines and gospel-like handclaps. And the back-up vocalists supplying the

As with his past efforts, Will Downing puts all his emotion into his singing and one wonders why he is not a bigger star here in America. Why have the British embraced him with open arms while many Americans ignore his wondrous talents? Hopefully, this record will change all that and Americans will recognize him for the true talent that he possesses. 118 BPM.

RODNEY BAKERR & THE ROCKING HOUSE CHICAGO MOB

"The 'Numbers' EP" (Rocking House/Gherkin 12" RH015)
Produced by Rodney Bakerr & The Rocking House Chicago Mob

As a follow-up to their underground hit "Feel Good," Rodney and his posse now offer us "The 'Numbers' EP" which contains four various tracks (or variations of a theme). As with "Feel Good," the energy is relentless and pumps in that underground way. R&B, club and house jocks are advised that this is one release that needs to

be heard.

Side A includes Mike's Mixx and the Rockin' Jazz Mix. Both groove in that 5 a.m. Garage fashion with lots of brass work and keyboards. It is basically an instrumental jungle/jazzy club cut but the addition of the crooning Tamico Lawson gives the music a diva style all its own.

The flip side offers something for jocks who desire a harder edge to their sound. We have Rodney's Numbers Mix and the Play It Again Mix with its fierce guitar licks. Check out the Kraftwerk samples. This side is also perfect for DOR/alternative jocks.

If given the right push, especially the A side, "The Numbers' EP" could be as massive as A Guy Called Gerald's "Voodoo Ray." 127 BPM.

DE DE O'NEAL

"Vulnerable" (Atlantic 12" DMD 1433) Produced by Craig Bartock and Harlan Lansky

"Heartbeat" (Vendetta Records 12" VE-7034) Produced by Robert Clivilles and David Cole

My reason for grouping these two songs together is because Cole and Clivilles have put their magical touch on both releases. On De De O'Neal's Atlantic debut the duo supplied additional post-production and mix while they produced, arranged and remixed Seduction's intense remake of "Heartbeat." Not only that, but both songs are decidedly downtempo at 100 BPM and pump in that C&C way.

"Vulnerable" finds newcomer De De O'Neal sounding a tad like

She sings this tale of vulnerability with all the style and confidence that Diana once possessed. (Remember "Upside Down" and "I'm Coming Out"?) Complimenting her finesse is the Cole and Clivilles rhythmic force that emanates from the speakers at full force. Very DJ friendly. This mixes wonderfully with Seduction's "Heartbeat."

With "Heartbeat," David and Robert have pumped up the song considerably from its LP state, giving it a fresh, new attitude. It is fierce and is guaranteed to get the masses moving. There ain't no way to sit this one out. You'll want to play the Club Mix and the (thanks for including it) Acapella. Also included is an aptly titled bonus track, "Free Your Body (It's Time To Get Hip House)," that smokes at 121 BPM.

A DJ P.S.: Other recent releases worth investigating include the pumped-up underground club feel of "Special" by Sir James (Strictly Rhythm 12" SR 1203). It pumps in that Cole & Clivilles way although they had nothing to do with this project . . . Foster McElroy's "Around The World In 80 Beats" (Atlantic 12" DMD 1447) takes us on a musical journey to various continents. All this in less than seven minutes. There is no way to resist the song's jazzy undercurrent . . . And from Profile we have two releases that first surfaced as imports a while back. They include "Rescue Me" by Debbie Malone (PRO-7277) which now sports hyped-up remixes by Richie Rich and the ecstatically tribal "Koro Koro" by No Smoke (PRO-7282) . . . Lastly, Adam Ant makes his much-anticipated return with an infectious Andre Cymone production (with additional production by Justin Strauss). It's called "Room At The Top" and it included remixes by Justin and Daniel Abraham (MCA 12" 23964) . . . Please note that "Ain't No Mountain High Enough" by Key III featuring Belinda Key which I reviewed in the last issue is a domestic release, not an import. It got placed in with the IMPORTS reviews by mistake. Sorry for any confusion this may have caused . . . And the beat goes on!

VICKI SHEPARD

"Somewhere" (Let The Music Play 12" LTMP-101) Produced by David Lawson

Produced and remixed by Steven Von Blau and Mark Styles

This song written by music greats, Stephen Sondheim and Leonard Bernstein, was a fitting finale to their great musical, "West Side Story." That updated and urbanized version of Shakespeare's "Romeo And Juliet" featured all the hatred, bigotry and rivalries of the original (and many other great songs). Yet, Sondheim/Bernstein ended the show with this wistful cry for acceptance and tolerance for two star-crossed lovers, who represent humanity.

Since, in all my time reviewing for DMR, I have covered many remakes, I feel I am repeating myself, but here we go again. Remakes/re-interpretations of "classic" material are still among the most popular of all the hits whether in the genres of Hi-NRG, House, Freestyle or Dance Rock. They are a continuing source of inspiration for the artist and producers of today. Now, out of Atlanta, Georgia comes a brand new label with a 12" that is assured of success in venues that feature Eurodisco.

"Somewhere" by Vicki Shepard on Let The Music Play Records, gives the song an almost reverent treatment. Dedicated to the New York night spot, The Saint, but in actuality an anthem for all people who suffer from hate and gather together, somewhere, this 128 BPM rendition is done in a straight ahead, simple way, production giving a warm glow and an emotional intensity that belies the sparse accompaniment and makes the whole proceedings that much more powerful. Very little else needs to be said since the people who put this record together are students of the Hi-NRG style and know how to put a good song together. There are several mixes including the Disconet and an aerobic mix as well as some dubs provided. (What! No house mix! Only kidding guys.) Suffice to say that this single is

LOU CASS

"Rated X" (Solid Beat Records 12" SB101)

Produced by James Ray

As I understand it, Lou Cass is another notorious celebrity in a long line that traces its way back to Andrea True and Marilyn Chambers. Stars of the silver screen who branch out into other fields of endeavor are nothing new. But the emergence of disco/dance music as a viable form of entertainment opened up whole new avenue for people with a gift and a dream.

With this cover of a Pat Benatar song, Lou Cass seeks to find a niche in the Hi-NRG/Pop chart. At 128 BPM's and with an upbeat pop flavor reminiscent of Paul Lekakis' "Boom, Boom, Boom, etc.," the production on "Rated X" is tailored for euro dance floors and even, possibly an off the wall, left field type of radio programming. Cass delivers the lyrics in a petulant, prettyboy sounding sneer, nasal, almost retro new wavey. And even with the new AIDS enforce morality, sex still sells. It's just a lot more safe. Gee, maybe as a promo item each 12" should come with a condom.

Anyway, "Rated X" is one of those fun/stupid little ditties that some will love and some will hate, but should be given a listen and a chance. And, Mr. Lou Cass gives another "engaging" performance.

"Poetry" (Requestline 12" RR-552) Produced by John Laskowski

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
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Hip-House is now the rage as we know it. Anyone can make a Hip-House record, all you need is a break beat sample, a 4x4 kick, a bassline, and a rap. Those are the ingredients, but the question is: "Is the end result any good?" Well, in this case I'm happy to say, yes. All the main ingredients are present as well as some spicy extras to add some flavor.

Innovator Dee's vocals are quite clever and so are the somewhat familiar samples used in this track. Besides the strong rap, there are powerful chants prevalent throughout the track. These chants are even presented on the flip side in their own version. Also on the flip is a bonus sample track titled "Future House" which has an array of samples layered over an ever-changing beat. My favorite version would have to be, Raw Poetry, which places an emphasis on the bassline and vocal chanting, which in my opinion, are the strong points of the single.

"Girl" (Upstairs Records 12" UR0-100)

Upstairs Records makes a strong debut with this pop-freestyle single. "Girl" is a moderate tempo cut with strong freestyle percussion and airy keyboards. The music is a West Coast interpretation of Latin Freestyle, and a nice one at that. The male vocals are strong, yet laid back, giving the track room to breathe. Overall, a nicely-produced single that should do well with proper exposure. It's already breaking out on radio in Hawaii and on the West Coast, and surely warrants attention from the New York and Florida dance markets. "Living In Oblivion" (Epic 12" 49-73156)

Produced by Jon St. James

This song hits like a ton of bricks – and it sticks! Not only are the melody and vocals very strong, but the mixes are excellent. Each mix takes a different approach, but each seems definitive. Breaks are plentiful, but they blend in naturally. I don't want to draw obvious comparisons, but would rather you listen to the record and discover the song for yourself. But it is synth/dance rock based.

The mixes are two by Jon St. James and Claude S and three by Dave Morales, who really goes the extra mile to make "Living In Oblivion" pack a punch. The crisp, full energy of this song is refreshing as a slap in the face after hearing so many lazy grooves, rip-off raps, muddy house tracks, impotent DOR and insipid, aimless synth/pop. This is a song with a sense of purpose that belies its title. It's nice to hear (and dance to) a strong song like this one. Welcome back Jon St. James. 125 BPM.

DEBORAH HARRY

"Sweet And Low" (Sire 12" 21446)

Produced by Chris Stein, Toni C and Deborah Harry


Here's a welcome single selection from Harry's cleverly titled "Def, Dumb and Blond" LP. This coolly sung, understated tune is reminiscent of "In Love With Love," but I like the hook even better. Can an artificial sweetener commercial be far behind?

I love the Justin Strauss/Daniel Abraham "Sweet House" mix and dub, for the beat, effects and great breaks. Edits are by Chep Nunez. Strauss doesn't blow the mood, but underpins Harry's ethereal vocal with just enough spunk to insure danceability. Of course, if your club is in the new movie "Attack of the Soul II Soul Clones" most anything would seem like Hi-NRG.

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SOUNDS OF THE SOUTH

in my lifetime! . . . Ed.) OK, OK, just kidding. But there were quite a number of new records "popping up" from all over the South this past week. Guess I better "jump to it" and tell you about a few of them, anyway. Here we go, "warts" and all! Hot Productions is really keeping the vinyl presses busy these days. Not only are they re-releasing that wonderful, gigantic collection of disco classics on 20 (yes, twenty) LP's, but also they are releasing lots of new product. Among the newest offerings are Cheek 2 Cheek with "You're No Good" (Pop Music 12" HAL 12149), **DSK** with "Work My Body Over (Sweat)" (Jack Pot 12" HAL 12150) and Meg with "Lover Girl" (Musicworks 12" HAL 12151) all at (305) 666-0445. "You're No Good" is a cover of the Linda Ronstadt classic with a smooth R&B twist. It comes with six versions including a club mix (5:50), a free-style mix (4:53) and assorted instrumental and a capella mixes. Really gives this song a new life and a new feel for a new audience that isn't all that familiar with the original pretty good stuff. "Work My Body Over (Sweat)" also has six different mixes including a freestyle mix (4:51) with matching instrumental and a capella versions and a radio mix (4:43) with the corresponding instrumental and bonus beats. This tune bears some similarities to Technotronic and "Pump Up The Jam" although it's not a rip-off. It just feels like it. The lead female vocalist (whoever she might be) has some strong pipes and the backup males aren't slouches either. Very danceable, despite the absence of a true dance mix. If you liked "Pump . . . " then you're sure to like this one, too. However, "Lover Girl" is a copy cat if I've ever heard one. Remember **Debbie** Deb and "When I Hear Music?" (Pandisc 12" (305) 948-6466). If you liked that tune, then you're sure to like this one too, since the music is almost identical. Only the words have been changed to protect whomever. There are four mixes including a club mix (5:04), a house mix (4:52), a radio mix and an instrumental dub. There's even the vocoder counterpoint to the female vocals, but at least the rap in the club mix is something a little different. Also, be sure and check

So what else is fresh? How about A Girl Named Mitchell with "Meltdown" (Bamboo 12" 101). This one fills the disk with four mixes including the original unique mix (7:24) and three new mixes courtesy of Pantera Wizard Rique "Billy Bob" Alonso. He's given us a hot mix (4:30), an atomic mix (6:30) and a wicked bonus mix (2:31). At 120 BPM this one should be a strong floor-packer. The instrumentation is fairly complex with percolating percussion, layered keyboards and occasional wailing guitar. The various special edit effects add considerable interest as well. Mitchell has a sweet voice that reminds me more than a bit of Stacey Q. Unfortunately, the title hook is just a bit weak, but a vocal progression straight from "Borrowed Love" by The SOS Band will certainly sound more than familiar. As usual, the "atomic" mix is filled with all sorts of interesting samples such as "I have a feeling we're not in Kansas anymore! Excellent!" It also has a very different feel from the other mixes - sounds like someone playing a jew's harp. The references to "I'm melting" (more Wizard of Oz) are just too good! "Who killed the witch?", probably Billy Bob. This mix really puts the other versions away. Excellent, indeed, and highly recommended.

out the above mentioned classic disco series - it's wonderful to have

some of those great hits back in circulation again.

Promise Circle has returned with "Do Your Dancing" (Roll 12" (305) 667-7253). Side A has three versions including club mix 1 (8:51), dub mix 1 (4:15) and radio mix 1. The flip offers club mix 2

(7:23) and radio mix 2. All versions are produced and mixed by ISH and cohorts Raul Rodriguez and Frank Callari. This also marks the reappearance of Roll Records after an absence of a little more than a year. (Last release was **Barbarella** in Dec. 1988.) Anyway, the entire affair reminds me a great deal of some of the later stuff from **Lime**. The tune has lots of keyboards and assorted percussion. The guy, who has a pretty decent voice, sings almost the entire song alone. The girl just does pop in every now and then. The hook, "Do Your Dancing," "I'll Do My Dancing . . We'll Do Our Dancing" is just plain weird. The instrumentation is outstanding, but it's just too much for the vocals to deal with. Still, at 118 BPM this is really danceable, but it's just not very catchy to me. Nonetheless, if you program Hi-NRG, by all means try it out. It feels faster than it really is.

Over at Vision Records, Ron and Steve have picked up London Exchange and "Memories of You" (Vision 12" 1234). This is an excellent alternative style dance tune that I've already discussed (DMR 12, issue 17). Not it's gone from limited availability to nationwide distribution - no excuses, don't miss it this time. Also from N. Miami comes JD Ranks 10 with "Girls Now-A-Days" (Vision 12" 1236 (305) 893-9191). This excellent scratch & rap comes with a radio mix and a club mix (6:01) at 106 BPM and a flip side hip house version (5:37) and bonus beats at 116 BPM. Of course the rap complains that all the girls want now-a-days is money. The rap is clean and clear and the pace is mid-tempo so it could appeal both north and south. The female replies are right on time, too and there's plenty of bass for those that gotta have it. Meanwhile, the flip is amazing! The hip-house mix makes this an entirely different song and it could go places that rap never goes. The house feel is powerful and the "Jump To It" samples of Aretha Franklin are all over the mix. This is really hard to describe, but I'll say this much - this is absolutely super. The production by Tony Garcia is near-perfect. Play both sides before you make up your mind. These are really two different songs that just happen to have some of the same words. This is my pick hit of the week!

Meanwhile, up in Orlando, Cheetah Records has a bunch of new labels and a bunch of new releases. There's Schnitt Acht with "Sub-Human Mind" (Maji 12" 9105), Vicious Bass with "Come On (Rock Freak)" (Cheetah 12" 9502) and Jamm Authority with "Small World" (Bushbaby 12" 9201). (All from Cheetah at (407) 236-9494). "Sub-Human Mind" has a remix version and an extended dub. This really is "new" music. The beats are real strong as are the other various instruments, like the steel pipes, maybe? This is very pleasantly industrial and the dub is especially good. At about 124 BPM this is pretty fast and very danceable. If you like industrial music, this one is definitely for you. Also check out the bonus cut "He's Back" (The Sci-Fi Club Mix). "Come On (Rock Freak)" is taken from the (previously reviewed) self-titled LP by D.J. Magic Mike and the Royal Posse, only now there's a super bass club mix in addition to the radio edit. "Small World" is something else again. This is just good strong dance music, even if it's not very DJ friendly. (The intro is off speed and the end is sudden.) Nonetheless, the female vocalist delivers the catchy title-hook in powerful fashion. Indeed, it is a small world after all. There are four mixes, all 4:48, so you'll have to play them all to see which one suits you the best. The flip side offers a "house" mix (read "Florida House") that is a bit easier to mix than the other versions, but it isn't really house in the true sense. Still at 122 BPM this is really pretty strong. Also check out the bonus cut "Wait A Minute" which has a "Miami" feel to it.

ach time I travel to England I am expecting, or at least hoping, that a new musical movement will be hitting to get me excited. Once again I faced a disappointment when I spent a week in London and house music is still going strong. Much of it is coming from Italy and a big English name is 808 State who are signed to Warners here. Some of the English seemed to have developed a new fondness for old country and blues and people are comparing priceless finds.

Shaman, on One Little Indian, is big in the clubs with a second 12" and should have an American deal soon. The outfit **Electronic**, who I wrote about previously, is working on an album and has a deal pending in the states. To freshen your memory, this is **Johnny Marr**'s (The The, Smiths) project with Neil Tennant (Pet Shop Boys) and Bernard Sumner (New Order). Does this mark the end of New Order? The import 12" of "Getting Away With It" is making lots of headway on alternative radio and in the clubs and even on a few of the hipper CHR stations. Manchester's Inspiral Carpets just signed to Mute Records. They'll have a single and an album in the next couple of months with a domestic release to follow shortly. Any fan of guitar pop will just love these boys who I managed to catch live in Amsterdam. I was a little skeptical about their singles but live, they've so much energy, I was sold. Abwarts have reformed (actually it's only one original member with a new group) and signed to Virgin who just released their first record in some time. Abwarts were part of the Neue Deutsche Welle at the beginning of the last decade. Nitzer Ebb, who are not German and love skateboarding, recently finished a new album. "Showtime" will be out on Geffen at the end of February with the first single, "Lightning Man," on its way soon. The album is rather diverse and will keep the band's dance base while also expanding their horizons. Definitely one for the collection.

The biggest videos on MTV Europe (outside of Phil Collins, Aerosmith and Billy Joel) were Lisa Stansfield (Blue Zone, Coldcut) and Sinead (I'm not a skinhead anymore) O'Connor. Sinead's video, which is a stark image of her face, is very striking. Nettwerk's **Bill Pritchard** was another popular artist on the channel. His black & white video for "Romance Sans Parole" is also eye-catching with some great location shots on the continent. IRS just issued his album in the states as the first in their deal with the Vancouver-based label. With some major label strong arm this guy could go really far. Here's to sensitive men making music!

The inimitable Gareth Jones (responsible for many of the Mutedreleases) is set to produce a solo album by Canmember Irmin Schmidt. Gareth has also just completed two remixes of Erasure's "Blue Savannah" which are absolutely brilliant. Look for them to come out stateside shortly via Reprise. The band, by the way, will be touring the states for two months starting February 13 in Boston. I caught them twice last week in the UK and I had goosebumps! Andy and Vince had several costume changes; the Chalmer Sisters are back and lovelier than ever; Michael Clarke choreographed two male dancers and the space age jungle of a set was consistently giving the audience something new to look at. Highlights of the hour and a half performance included "Star", "Chains of Love", "A Little Respect", "Oh L'Amour", "Sometimes", "Blue Savannah", and their cover of Cerrone's "Supernature". Opening for them was the Czechoslovakian group Ocean who sounded a bit like Ian McCulloch singing with New Order sporting funny haircuts and somewhat military clothing.

Moev are set to start recording their new album in Vancouver with John Fryer producing (Depeche, Love & Rockets, AC Marias,

etc., etc.). Nettwerk labelmates Skinny Puppy are readying their second single from "Rabies" which will be out on Nettwerk/Capitol February 28. Entitled "Warlock" it will have as its B side the original mix of "Tin Omen" which is a must for Puppy fans. Ministry is currently on tour in the states with Controlled Bleeding and the German KMFDM. I recently caught them at the Ritz where friends said KMFDM were brilliant but I showed up too late to catch them. Ministry played real hard beyond the border of metal. Puppy's Kevin Ogre was a guest as was some Bronx rapper whose name escapes me. It seemed as though there were a dozen people on stage separated from the audience by a very high chain link fence. Nice touch. While we're on the subject of tours, Severed Heads hit the road on March 6 in Vancouver covering Canada and the US, ending up in Chicago on April 14. Labelmate MC 900 Ft. Jesus will be opening the dates. An album is set for a February 28 release through Nettwerk/IRS. In the meantime there's a brand new 12" called "I'm Going Straight to Heaven" which is sort of industrial funk. Two versions on the A side boast excellent rhythms full of sax with jazz and African overtones and hit you right in your center of gravity. Vocoderized rap vocal serves as another instrument or layer with a tribal chorus coming in and out. I can't listen to this without dancing. Two tracks comprise the B side which were edited by George Maniatis. They take off in a somewhat different direction but keep that ethnic feel and were made for the dance floor. A personal fave.

Betty Boo who was featured on the **Beatmasters** "Any Way You Wanna" is working on solo material to be released by Rhythm King shortly. Also from that label, **Merlin** just completed a new album which will be coming out domestically in another month or so.

Here's to overcoming jet lag! See you next ish . . .

Baker "Swing Low" mix and dub. Here as never before, Baker masterfully blends contemporary sounds with his classic 80's style. I can't decide what to call this amalgamation, but I like it. The mix keeps getting better as it goes on, so listen all the way through. There's a good break buried in the dub that's also a fine two copy intro. Editing by Omar Santana.

Side two ends with a superb funky take, the Strauss crew's "Sweet Chariot Mix," which sensibly provides a slight rock edge for programmers so inclined. This is also a viable alternative radio mix.

Welcome back Deb. Again. 123 BPM.

MC HAMMER

"Dancin' Machine" (Capitol 12" 15542) Produced by James Early and Felton Pilot

I was somewhat surprised to see MC Hammer win out over Tone Loc at the usually predictable American Music Awards (also known as Guns 'N Roses' last live TV gig). But it's really a sign of things to come. Hammer has been kicking it out for some time, racking up serious numbers, and is now poised to grab the limelight as the revolving door of rap continues to spin.

What I like best about this guy is his great dance moves and live presence (great dancing rappers are strangely rare in that dance-oriented genre). It's also impressive (and smart) that Hammer chooses a decent variety of musical beats, creating accessibility while remaining genuine and true to himself. And bottom line, the man can rap up a storm.

I'd recommend "Dancin' Machine" as a good Hammer primer for DJ's who haven't gotten into him much in the past. For one thing, the higher BPM puts it in reach of DJ's who avoid much rap because it is too slow to work into their regular program. Also, the use of the Jacksons' riff creates familiarity. To Hammer's credit, he has someone play the riff instead of sampling it. No one loves a good bite more than me, but for rap to grow (and not be sued), some musicians are going to have to be involved.

Of the three mixes, I liked the club the best, but there really wasn't a lot of remixing done on this record. I'd like to see one of the prominent DJ mixers have a go at it. This record has the club

potential to warrant some extensive remixes. 121 BPM.

BIG AUDIO DYNAMITE

"Free/The Bottom Line" (WTG 12" 73159)
Produced by Mick Jones and Bill Price

Big Audio Dynamite just continues to blow me away. I can even forgive the gratuitous use of promo lines from the upcoming film "Flashback," because they fit in so well here. "Free" is a percolating, hypnotic dance number, which in a little flashback of my own I'll call groovy.

The mix selection is a bit limited, as is occasionally the case with BAD. But I can live with the hopped-up club mix, and I have even seen the single version ignite dance floors on the right night. If "Free" is a movie "one-off," BAD really has talent to burn. 123 BPM.

Flip the record over for the great Rick Rubin remix of "The Bottom Line." Big Audio Dynamite is one band that lives up to its name. 118 BPM.

HI-NRG/EUROBEAT

ix months ago, who would have thought that the most likely successor to **Rick Astley** as the king of pop/dance music might be **Ernest Kohl**. Certainly not I. But then again six months ago I hadn't yet heard "Follow Your Heart," probably the best dance single to cross my desk since "This Time I Know It's For Real."

I wasn't much of a fan of Kohl's earlier efforts on the Dice/Sutra label but "Follow Your Heart," his second single for Minneapolis-based Wide Angle Records, proves that the success of his recent #1 dance hit "To Save The Love" was not simply a lucky strike but rather the first example of Kohl's maturity as a polished pop professional. The enthusiasm "To Save The Love" inspired in Hi-NRG and progressive pop clubs is about to be rewarded ten-fold with one of those rare follow-up records that actually usurps its predecessor.

The production on "Follow Your Heart" is SAW-inspired with just enough contemporary American influence to let it stand above the import competition. Produced, arranged and written by Kohl and **Steve Skinner**, this 120 BPM 12" ships this week with three perfect mixes to highlight Kohl's strong, clear vocals which are, in a word, terrific. Side A's extended dance mix has plenty of energy courtesy of **Fred Tenny** while the flip features a streamlined radio edit and an extended "Heart and Soul" mix by **Walter McLean**. The McLean mix has a distinct Ten City feel to it with plenty of sparkling keyboards and back beating to wear out your dance floor joyously. Get on this one quickly, boys, before Top 40 radio finds out about it and steals the credit. Sample cassettes of "Follow Your Heart" are already generating pre-release reports to the Hi-NRG chart researchers and

all indications are that this single is going to be a monster!

Speaking of Ernest Kohl, he's scheduled to be one of the performer/presenters at the second annual Hi-NRG Dance Music Awards to be held this summer in New York City at the start of the New Music Seminar. The exact date and location of the awards presentation haven't been announced as of yet but all of DMR's reporting Hi-NRG DJ's should be in possession of their nominating ballot forms by this time. Retail Spotlight: Georgia's newest NRG outlet is **E.D.'s Gourmet Records**, located at 1510-I Piedmont Ave., Atlanta, GA 30324. They specialize in vinyl with most of the emphasis, of course, on import and domestic dance singles. In just six short months, partners **Eric Lopez** and **David Owens** have turned their small storefront into a popular DJ and GP (general public) pit stop with their excellent selection and personal service. Eric and David (hence the store's initial moniker) are both talented Atlanta-area disc jockeys who bring their special expertise into practice seven days a week from noon til 9 PM daily except Sunday, when they close at 6 PM. They offer mail order and pride themselves on having one of the region's most comprehensive selections of classic 12" singles, stocking every available title they can get their hands on! American Release News: In addition to the aforementioned Ernest Kohl, U.S. labels in general have busy new release schedules filled with potential NRG chart entries. Sire is the first with the excellent new **Deborah Harry** 12", "Sweet & Low" (120). This one gets a

No word yet on a commercial release date for Debbie's labelmates **Erasure**, who's promo-only twelve "Blue Savannah" streaks up to #2 in only its third week on the Hi-NRG Top 50. (Incidentally, Erasure is chasing themselves to the top this issue, with their current *import* 12", "Supernature" also jumping into the top ten as "Drama," their last single, hangs on at #9. This is the first time, as far as we can tell, that any artist has placed three singles simultaneously in the top ten!)

The latest from the **B-52's**, "Roam" (Reprise/134), broke first out of Fort Lauderdale (thanks to Mike Gaffney) and seems assured of a rapid fire rise to the top as more that half of our DMR reporters listed the single in its first week of release. Ditto for the new "Espana" remix of Kylie Minogue's "Wouldn't Change A Thing" (Geffen/112), which is being treated like a new record by many spinners and jumps more than ten notches on the current list, almost six months after it first charted as an import. Tony King gets the remix credit on that one. RCA is all set to go with Mitsou's "Bye Bye Mon Cowboy" (133), a regionally popular French import that should be charting toute suite considering the print support the label's giving this lovely Hi-NRG piece with their "Cherchez La Mitsou . . . she's going to teach you French" campaign. Capitol/SBK is also in the midst of a successful dance campaign with two new singles debuting on the NRG chart including **Technotronic**'s "Get Up" (126) and the latest from **Duran** Duran called "Decadance." Newcomers Eric & The Good Good Feeling may also hit the mark shortly with their debut SBK single, "Good Good Feeling," a rousing, R&B-flavored NRG piece that clocks in at 120 BPM. Vendetta has rush-released **Seduction**'s perfect after hours remake of Taana Gardner's "Heartbeat" (102), which has had the pulse of morning music fans all aflutter since the "Nothing Matters Without Love" album first appeared late last year. Equally enthusiastic are the progressive energy fans about "Will You Be There" by Celebrate The Nun (126), though they'll be disappointed to learn that Epic, which had been rumored to be signing the group, passed on the single despite its massive NRG club and radio play in New York. Seems it wasn't "alternative" enough for their plans, but take heart. An excellent Westside/UK remix of "Will You Be There" surfaced this week and several majors appear to be interested in it.

Though some reporters expressed disappointment at the news that **Belinda Carlisle**'s new MCA 12" wouldn't be the lovely "La Luna" (see UK Imports ahead), most will be quickly won over by Justin Strauss' wonderful new remix of "Summer Rain" (130). With additional keyboards by **Eric Kupper**. "Rain" is powerful, American pop-energy at its perky California best. Justin Strauss is also responsible for the NRGetic remix of **Adam Ant**'s melodic, DOR-tinged single, "Room At The Top" (120), an enthusiastic priority for super MCA promotion person **Joyce Appey**, who's determined to take this 12" all the way to the top. (And some say that U.S. record labels

aren't supporting energetic dance tracks? HA!)

Atlantic's also got a hot month planned, including a priority push for the latest 12" from Sinitta. It's a gift to budget-conscious club jocks and music fans from the label's talented A&R man, Mark Nathan, who put Sinitta's two recent import singles, "Lay Me Down Easy" (110) and "Love On A Mountain Top" (126) back to back on the new twelve, labeling the sides "Lo-NRG" and "Hi-NRG" rather than A & B. Also due from Atlantic in the next few weeks is a killer remake of Eddie Kendrick's "Date With The Rain" by Jamie Principle. Steve "Silk" Hurley is the producer and though both he and Jamie posses basically "house" credentials, this track is ripe with multi-format possibilities. Watch for it! On the independent front, Megatone announced plans for another limited edition Sylvester 12" in their classic collectors series, though it won't hit the stores until late spring at the earliest. It's a brand new mix of "Don't Stop" featuring an all new bassline a la Jimmy Somerville's current version of "Mighty Real." The flip side of "Don't Stop" will feature a very special medley of Sylvester's greatest hits remixed together by one of San Francisco's finest, Mark Watkins. Label president Marty Blecman also reports that Jeannie Tracy is now back in the studio working on a new project, also scheduled for this spring. Meanwhile, Sylvester's posthumous "Immortal" album debuts on the Hi-NRG Top 50

inter finally came to Idaho. Listening to all the ski maniacs complain about the lack of snow was starting to give me Epstein-Barr. Listening to the new music for this month has given me a big thrill. Especially items like "Opposites Attract" by Paula Abdul on Virgin records (hi Cary). The video is the best, and the instrumentation is spry and crisp. The lyrical idea is borrowed from musicals like Calamity Jane or Annie Get Your Gun; lyrically pitting two personalities against one another. This song has a wide appeal, because almost anyone can find something to relate to in this song . . . and, it's a lot of fun! Jazzersize and dance-oriented aerobic class can borrow moves from the video to execute in class. Pitch it up just a bit and use it for an invigorating warm-up, lifting the knees high in a placement march, arms straight out to the side, palms up and pressing.

I've only heard Tina Turner's new song "Steamy Windows" on the radio here in Boise and there is a 12" but I haven't been able to capture it yet. It's my ex-husband's favorite song, but I'm not holding that against Tina. I suggest locating a copy of the record on Capital and utilizing it for a vigorous pre-aerobic set of funky chicken walks and every other kind of Tina Turner move you could borrew

Every aerobic instructor will want to get the 12" of "Lambada" by Kaoma on Epic. From the breezy Portuguese vocal to the burnin' congo disco beat, this single has World Music written all over it. Educate your audience, they whooped and hollered from the first beat when tested in Boise at the "Body Firm."

Try to talk the record store into opening a copy of "Burning Inside" by Ministry (Sire) so you can listen to 156 BPM of doom and gloom and decide if it would work for you. I suppose it would work for funeral aerobics or if you smiled a lot or did sight gags. Please check it out. Since "Pump Up The Jam" was such a nice record,

SBK is releasing a new single, "Get Up, (Before The Night) on a 12". Another nice record, because it's impossible to stay still when you hear this. Your class will enjoy the "Get Up, Get Up, Get Down . . ." and you can use this song to explore your levels: go up and down . . .

Risse is a smash in class and at the bar where I work, The Emerald City. A lot of people like to hear old music at this bar. We are trying to get them interested in something new, with Risse's "Chain Of Fools," everybody is happy. "Chain Of Fools" is a shoe-in for low-impact, although it helps to pitch it up a little and make large Diana Ross and the Supremes type movement. It's the easiest song to think of movement for, all this and it's on Atlantic Records! Should be able to locate, even in Muleshoe, Texas.

Check out Mary Davis on Tabu records, "Don't Wear It Out" (120 BPM). "You cannot just treat me like a ragdoll" and so on. It's cute for floorwork and strengthening work with weights. Also good for floorwork is the new, slightly sleazy version of "Tainted Love" on Epic records by Impedance (121). You'll be able to decipher the melody, it's clearly in there somewhere.

If your classes liked the Pet Shop Boys, they'll love "Nothing Changes" by Urohaus on Profile. It's a minor key song written with eerie oooowahs and terrific delay effects on the groovy male vocal. Work in an abdominal set for 50 counts, then roll over to elbows and knees for tiny double-time leg lifts for 20 counts on each side. Pretty-boy Adam Ant wants to be king of the Ant-Heap again, and he may well get there with his new single on MCA, "Room At The Top" (120 BPM). Cool pop-rock that will go well with the conditioning portion of your class.

I've recently been asking Record Pools what makes them unique from other Pools in their area and what their particular Pool plans to do to impact the industry in the 90's. Following are a few of the responses so far. Additional responses will be printed in the next column. It's amazing to note the wide responses received with some being very business-like with what sounds to be effective activities, and with some Pools having almost no response at all (which leads me to believe that there are some VERY active and

effective Pools and that there may still be just a *few* who really do little more than hand out records and collect dues. Comments anyone?)

Record Pool Business Center's Eddie Rivera states that his Pool is directly involved with the community, clubs, artists and DJ's. The Pool prides itself on cultivating talent from within the organization to new heights. A few examples are Robert Clivilles, Tony Moran, Lil Louis and Andy Panda. RPBC also has contracts with several area radio stations providing remixes and hot mix segments. The Pool has sponsored concert series' drawing close to 10,000 people at some events with parades drawing up to 90,000 people. Eddie tries to create unity with Pools, DJ's and Industry Supporters. Currently RPBC is working with the Board of Education and Z-100 on the biggest high school concert series ever with a drug awareness campaign theme. Possible sponsors of the event at this time are Pepsi, Reebok and Burger King. The concerts will involve artists, dancers, DJ's and celebrities to bring awareness of the drub problem to the neighborhoods and streets. For an informative look into RPBC's activities, dial 212-245-6438.

Mike Macharello is handling day to day activities at Let's Dance Record Pool in Chicago allowing "Jungle" Jorge Suarez more time in the studio among other projects. Let's Dance has recently expanded the format of their Chicago Music Magazine both in size and variety, with an increased circulation of 20,000 copies. Mike is putting more emphasis on the magazine as he believes that print media is an important tool in promoting dance music records in addition to the nightly efforts of his club DJ's. Plans include more Pool Listening Parties based on the success of past meetings, which communicate feedback to the labels and are an opportunity for DJ's to interact with promoters and label reps. For more info on activities at Let's Dance, call 312-525-7553.

Wide Angle Record Pool believes they have a much stronger impact on record sales via club promotion rather than radio having the upper hand. Maurice Bellfield, the Pool's Director, relates that dance receives little exposure on local radio so it's up to the jocks to break the records at club level. Fridays are the setting for informal listening parties at their offices where new records are played and feedback is exchanged. Maurice believes his DJ's are more closely knit than as is the case at some Pools allowing for more honest feedback and interaction. W.A.R.P. is also responsible for the Pool's record label, Wide Angle Records.

Dixie Dance King's Dan Miller highlights his Pool's activities with a consistent publication released on schedule every two weeks as opposed to some who have less consistent release patterns, computer printouts which gauge feedback on almost every record serviced from every DJ's individual reaction, with 150 members covering six states. Miller stays in constant contact with local and regional promotion people by hitting the label branches every two weeks. Miller believes their job is to take the hits from the dance floor to radio. Additionally, DDK runs the CD Pool "Compact Kings" which services DJ's utilizing the CD format in their clubs. The DDK Pool can be reached at 404-457-4588.

"Was That All There Was" (Syncopate 12" UK)

Produced by Marshall Jefferson

Remixes by David Morales, Les Adams

Considering the success Kym Mazelle had in '88 with "Useless," her Marshall Jefferson-produced debut, it's a shame that we have had to wait so long to hear more from this exceptionally talented deep soul diva. Let me add my voice to the buzz on the street . . . It's been worth the wait. DJ's, if you're looking for the singles, it's time to hit the import racks. Out just two weeks and already available in two superb packages, Kym Mazelle's cover of the Jean Carn classic "Was That All It Was" is storming the English charts. The David Morales Def Mix version is a contemporary disco scorcher with flawless, if not at times too slick, production. The Classic Philly Mix by Les Adams, just released, takes this song all the way home. Richly layered with a full complement of that soulful Philly sound, lush with strings, keys and horns, this will be the mix of choice for your more sophisticated crowd. And the vocals? Kym Mazelle sounds absolutely fantastic as she works the groove soaring from soulful to sultry. The bottom line: Pick your package, this song is going to the top. You'll probably want both.

ULTRA NATE

"It's Over Now" (WEA 12" UK) Produced by The Basement Boys Remixed by Tony Humphries

It's not often that an import makes this heavy an entry into the DMR charts, but then considering how long various bootleg tapes of this track have been floating around N.Y. DJ booths, it's really not all that surprising. In a year that has seen an absolute explosion of new female vocal talent, here's yet another new superstar in the making. You want hooks, Ultra Nate's got it. You want attitude, Ultra Nate's got it. Delivered in a sing song style Ultra Nate's vocals slip between the almost spoken and the full force pyrotechnics of a soul diva in heat. Where the original Classic Mix featured an obnoxiously single-minded saxophone riff placed way up front, the Tony Humphries mix reins it in and lets the groove do it's magic. Clocking in at a slow 120 BPM, "It's Over Now" is quite at home next to Adeva's "Respect." Ultra Nate's magic lies in the richness of her voice, and the grace with which her delivery shifts from nonchalant to plaintive. The underlying track, is simple, potent, and a guaranteed crowd pleaser.

BLACK BOX

"I Don't Know Anybody Else" (Groove Groove Melody 12" GGM 8909-Italy)

Produced by Groove Groove Melody

Coming high on the heels of their debut smash, "Ride On Time," Black Box now prove that they have a real talent for writing and singing an original song. No, Black Box is not a one-hit wonder and this song more than proves it. "I Don't Know Anybody Else" manages to surpass "Ride On Time" in terms of energy and intensity.

With this release, we are given one of the most infectious rhythm tracks of recent times. The percussion, guitar and bassline all pump. And then there is the hook-laden keyboard riff that appears throughout the song. It is the keyboard that pushes this song along. One listen and you'll know what I mean. The vocals, too, are extremely impressive. The featured (unnamed) vocalist wails with such intensity and emotion that divas such as Izora, Martha, Loleatta and Rochelle will quickly come to mind.

For me, it's reassuring to know that there is real talent at work under the guise of Black Box. I look forward to their forthcoming LP. Extremely fierce at 121 BPM.

DR. MOUTHQUAKE

"Love On Love" (MP/Virgin 12" PROT3-UK) Produced by Jeremy Healy

For those of you craving "deep" R&B music in the tradition of Ten City, Blaze, Paul Simpson and Larry Heard comes this new British 12" by Dr. Mouthquake (who comes up with these names???) entitled "Love On Love." It has that warm feeling that is felt on all the current Paul Simpson product and vocals that rival those of the Ten City crew. Beyond that, it easily captures that nostalgia feeling of early Philly product. The additional production and remix by Bruce Forest and Paul Wright has given the song a contemporary pumping rhythm track that recalls the days when Bruce ruled the court at New York's Better Days (not to be confused with the current state of the club).

"What we need is love on love. We're on the road to nowhere I guess... No need for violence, anger or greed. That's what we need. Sho 'nuff. You need love on love." The message here certainly is love (on love) and it is delivered with the urgency of an ACT-UP meeting. R&B clubs will eat this one up.

Two mixes are provided – Mouthquake Master Mix and Dub Of Death. Both provide enough rhythm, percussion, keyboards and jazzy synth work to please all R&B jocks. The Dub is extremely fierce with its bass drop-outs occurring throughout. A great song with a timely message. 122 BPM. Definitely worth the import price.

ART FREEDLAND

LONNIE GORDON

"Happenin' All Over Again/Right Before My Eyes" (Supreme Records 12" UK)

Fave vocalist Lonnie Gordon teams up with Stock, Aitken and Waterman in this strikingly unusual production direction for PWL studios. Stepping aside from their traditional techno-pop production approach SAW provides us with a Phil Harding mixed "Hip-House" treatment of this otherwise pop/NRG offering. Featuring all the production values that make SAW offerings such a joy, "Happenin' All Over Again" works its 124 BPM tempo with the added magic of Lonnie's rich vocals. For those who feel uncomfortable with the Hip-House treatment (like myself) given on the A side an "Italiano House Mix" is provided which seems more suited to the lyrical arrangement. Accenting more of the inherent pop/NRG nuances in the track, this "B" side mix achieves a more "catchy" feel while also giving programmers a solid dance groove.

For variety . . . a cover of "Right Before My Eyes" (Patti Day/M. Zager) is also included on the pressing. Produced by Bruce Forest, this 120 BPM track should intrigue listeners with its almost hypnotic house groove . . . very laid back . . . very catchy.

all the way up at #30 with club jocks across the country reporting almost every cut on it! From the deep south, **Lee Waters**' priority pet project **Merci Mercy** in readying a new 12", "Looking For Love," to ship shortly. Lee was responsible for their first single's amazing (albeit regional) popularity with key southern NRG reporters though lately, jocks in the Northeast appear to be belatedly discovering "If There's A Chance," the earlier MM twelve.

Though the Shannon/Otis Liggett influence may not fit into all NRG programs, **Concett Bradley**'s "Tommy Boy" is too good to pass up. Sexy and straightforward vocals dance nimbly over a powerful production that's slick and irresistibly catchy. This 122 bpm single is on the Echo-U.S.A. label and should have no trouble ascending any applicable playlist. Speaking of independents and the chart, kudos are in order for all of the people involved in the new number one, "Somewhere" by **Vicki Shepard**. Starting with **Fred Hand** and all the folks at Importes in Chicago, who discovered the record and passed it on to Disconet's **Steven Von Blau**, who gave "Somewhere" its initial push, and finally to remarkable **Steve Berman**, who signed the record to his fledgling Let The Music Play label and worked tirelessly to promote it. Congratulations, boys, on a job well done!

Now on to the DJ-only remix subscriber services, starting with a hot new set from **Hot Tracks** that includes two truly spectacular 1989 medleys, one Hi-NRG and the other for across the board contemporary dance. The issue also features new mixes of "To Save The Love" (Ernest Kohl) and "Mantra . . ." (S-Express), both reworked by **J.R. Clements**. Additionally, the new Hot Tracks features a "housey" yet playable remake of "Chain Of Fools" by **Risse** (120) and a 1990 "Beat Me Again, Please" remix of the 115 BPM sleaze classic "Dominatrix Sleeps Tonight" with lots of new breaks courtesy of **Chris Cox**.

Disconet gets to play catch-up this month, scheduling for its subscribers not one but two sets to make up for the delay caused by their recent move and reorganization. The first ships this week and includes an excellent 1990 remix of **Gino Soccio**'s "Dancer" by **Mark Syles** as well as their own traditional year-end mediey and a beautiful, high BPM exclusive "Aerobic Fantasy" instrumental that must be heard to be appreciated.

UK Imports: Motor City's lan Levine has released his first compilation collection featuring the Motown alumni artists he's been working with for the past year. The album should be in stores now and it's appropriately titled "Motor City All Stars," featuring some of the best 12" mixes from the retro-specialty label's inaugural season. Sleaze fans are snapping up the latest from Soul II Soul called "Get A Life" (104) as much for the flip (a hot new remix of "Back To Life") as they are for side one. From WEA/U.K., it's easy to love the Beloved's latest, "Hello" (120), another winner from those consistent British hit makers. Avoid possible disappointment by previewing before purchasing the latest from diva Precious Wilson. "I May Be Right 4 U" (S&M) is a departure in style from her more energetic repertoire of late. Although it's beautifully sung and checks in at a solid 124 BPM, the excitement level is nil and the record is boring. For some real excitement, grab Lonnie Gordon's "Happening All Over Again" (Supreme/126) a deliciously busy Phil Harding & lan Curnow mastermix that combines the best Stock Aitken Waterman ingredients (as I reported last issue on this twelve's imminent release. they wrote, produced and arranged it) with seductive underground rhythms that don't let up for a second!

While it's been widely reported that **Felly** has left **Technotronic**, no one is really sure at this point who Felly actually is. Like many, I assumed Felly to be the group's lead vocalist, yet those unmistakable "Pump Up The Jam" pipes resurfaced this week on a terrific house/NRG hybrid called "Spin The Wheel" by **Hi Tek 3** (Total-UK/128), with credit on the record sleeve given to "**Thomas De Quincey**, courtesy of Technotronic." (You figure it out.) The late Sylvester's re-release popularity is spreading overseas as well, with a brand

new (and exceptionally good!) remix of "You Make Me Feel (Mighty Real)" surfacing this week on the Southbound label, pitched down a bit this time to 125. The timing could work in this record's favor as the Jimmy Somerville cover version (which gets its own new remix this week) streaks into the Hi-NRG top ten from its impressive #34 debut last issue. Lastly, from England, there's two titles to note from MCA/UK: "N-R-G" by **Adamski** and the **Belinda Carlisle** 12" "LaLuna" that we mentioned a few paragraphs back. The latter has been getting lots of American NRG attention as an album track and the new mix by **Steve Beltram** should only broaden its support base. Adamski is an electronic instrumentalist who's "NRG" level is technically excellent and incredibly catchy.

And the rest of the world: With Midem occupying most of the major European labels' attention for the last few weeks of January, new release schedules remained all but frozen, though some worthy titles did sneak through before this issue's deadline. From Italy, the wonderfully innovative Groove Groove Melody label has followed up their controversial (and wildly popular) "Ride On Time" with a new vocalist (!) for Black Box's sophomore single "I Don't Know Anybody Else" (122). It's quite good and should fit nicely into programs that welcomed its sample-heavy predecessor. From Holland, Kaoma continues to single-handedly mainstream their native Brazilian beat into an international dance trend! With "Lambada" still soaring on dance and pop charts all over the world, they've just released a new one called "Dancado Lambada" (CBS/120). The Kaoma sound is fresh and original, exactly the opposite description that might be given to another new arrival from Holland called "Jump On The Floor" by Black Kiss featuring Cherita (Who's/126). For those who've got no problem with plagiarism the Black Kiss single will undoubtedly program beautifully alongside "Pump Up The Jam" as it's basically the same song with new words.

From ZYX in Germany, the latest from **Cetu Javu** is double-sided dance floor dynamite! The A Side is the aerobically-tempoed "So Strange" (142) while its 124 BPM flip, "A Donde" should meet with across the board acceptance, especially with those who appreciate a DOR tinge to the NRG programs. Switzerland's Fantasy label has two current twelves just now becoming widely available. Though they first surfaced in limited runs a few weeks ago, they both bear mentioning again, starting with the latest from **Shy Rose** called "Gimme Love" (124), a **Cerrone** cover with lots of new energy to surround its traditional, string-laden arrangement. The other Fantasy single is the deceptively titled "Housework" (124) by **Toney D and the Love Trip Orchestra**. It's an exceptionally beautiful, NRGetic instrumental that comes flipped with the jazzy sleaze version of Shy Rose's recent smash, "You Are My Desire."

Before we close, some congratulations are in order for two of our favorite people, **Dennis and Lynn Wakil** of New York City's legendary Decadance. They became proud parents of a beautiful baby girl named **Gia** over the holidays and we wish the happy family all the fun, love and money (FLM) that they can handle in the exciting years to come. In fact, I wish that for all of you! Happy Valentine's Day – **Dean Ferguson**


"Hello" (WEA 12" UK)

This 102 BPM track exhibits a throbbing groove which "hooks" listeners rather than the often tongue in cheek lyrics. Very percussive and bassline driven in the "Honky Tonk" remix, "Hello" should "hit" at progressive clubs. A more guitar influenced (LP) version can be heard on the flip which should appease rockers. Video could prove interesting given the lyrical content. Good solid track . . . but not a blockbuster.

"NRG" (MCA UK)

"NRG" (120 BPM) is just one of the featured cuts on Adamski's "Live And Direct" EP that is receiving rave review in the U.K., which proves that the "acid" trend is far from dead. Driven with a relentless fervor "NRG" showcases the true musical talent and vision Adamski has. No progressive jock should be without this very worthwhile EP... it's HOT.
